Indigo Gazelle Tours is excited to offer this exclusive, private Golf & Culture small group tour to Morocco that will reveal championship golf course gems relatively unknown to American golfers and also explore the cultures, colors, cuisine, and hospitality for which this North African country is renowned. Indigo Gazelle's Owner, Morocco specialist, and golf enthusiast, Alex Safos, will lead this intimate, adventurous, and unique tour. Experience the romance of travel once again on a journey tailor-made for it.

This multi-layered itinerary will literally and metaphorically cover much ground and traverse: the cosmopolitan and sophisticated capital of Rabat, home to Robert Trent Jones' acclaimed Royal Dar Es Salaam (Red) course which hosts the Hassan II Trophy tournament for PGA Tour Champions and has also been a stop on the European tour; the picturesque mountain village of Ifrane—Morocco's "Little Switzerland"—nestled in the Middle Atlas Mountains and home to the spectacular Michlifen golf course designed by Jack Nicklaus; the spiritual capital and "soul of Morocco," Fes, with its fantastic 8th century medina (old city) —a UNESCO World Heritage Site brimming with architectural marvels and incredible markets (sougs)—and nearby, historic Royal Golf Fes course designed by Cabell Robinson; the iconic, much-Instagrammed "Blue Pearl" village of Chefchaouen, snug in the wild Rif Mountains and rich in Jewish and Muslim heritage; the storied city of **Tangier** with its beatnik and libertine past, now remade into a modern, major port and Mediterranean luxury destination astride the Strait of Gibraltar...and the nearby seaside links course of Al Houara designed by Vijay Singh and Graham Marsh; and a final night in Casablanca, home to the magnificent Hassan II Mosque and replica of "Rick's Cafe" preserved in an eponymous, fine-dining restaurant where the 1942 Bogart and Bergman film is memorialized.

This experiential insiders tour will include: lodging and all meals; 4 rounds of golf, including cart; spa credits for non-golfers; guided UNESCO World Heritage Site tours; a guest lecture on Moroccan culture and Islam; a hands-on cooking class; a winery tour and tasting; a private musical performance; and leisure time for shopping Morocco's artisanal treasures (textiles, rugs, lanterns, leather goods, jewelry, woodwork, ceramics, zellij tile, brasswork, etc.—let us know in advance of the tour is there is something you are specifically seeking so we may guide you to appropriate, reputable sources). Prepare to sample the country's diverse local fare (tagines, b'stilla, couscous, rustic breads, honey-drenched pastries, succulent olives, fresh oranges, reputable wine, and ever-flowing mint tea—just to name a few), and to discover this mesmerizing culture through its people, art, food...and outstanding golf courses.

Casablanca/Rabat Days 1 & 2

The metropolis of Casablanca, Morocco's largest city and home to the largest port in Africa, is our portal to Morocco. Depending on arrival times, we may tour the landmark Hassan II Mosque astride the Atlantic—one of the largest mosques in North Africa and a mammoth showcase of Moroccan artisanship built by the former king, Hassan II.

We will transfer to our lodgings, the 5* Conrad Rabat Arzana along the Atlantic Ocean, about an hour away from Casablanca and on the outskirts of the capital. This will be our lovely base for two nights, the site of 1 of our dinners, and its tranquil spa will beckon non-golfers and post-round golfers alike. An ideal cocoon to let jet leg dissipate.

Rabat is one of the rare capital cities to be awarded UNESCO World Heritage Designation, and a guided tour of its sites may include: Le Tour Hassan, an impressive minaret began by the Almohad Sultan Yacoub al-Mansour in 1195...its 44 meters and intricate design overlooking the remains of an ancient mosque and the Oued (river) Bou Regreg; the ornate Mausoleum of Mohammed V which is the resting place of both King Mohammed V (the king during Morocco's independence from France and Spain in 1956-58) and King Hassan II, the grandfather and father of the current king, King Mohammed VI, respectively; and

—time and group energy permitting,—a beautiful stroll through the placid, crumbling ruins of the walled Roman settlement of Sala Colonia (aka Chellah), one of the last remaining outposts of the Empire, converted into a medieval necropolis under the 14th century Merenid dynasty...Morocco's deep layers and length of history are vivid in this atmospheric setting.

The golfing highlight will be a round at the Royal Golf Dar Essalam Red ("Rouge") course, designed by Robert Trent Jones and completed in 1971. This is the flagship

course that propelled Moroccan golf to center stage and has been a stop on the European Tour and host to the PGA Tour Champions Hassan II Golf Trophy. From the tournament tips, it poses a torturous 7633 yard, Par 73, 78.7 rating, and 155 slope. This is a signature RTJ course vs. golfer, risk vs. reward experience. Carved through a cork oak forest with familiar RTJ dog legs, liberal use of bunkers, and

raised greens, golfers will also note authentic Roman columns between the 11th and 12th holes which were transferred by King Hassan II from the Roman ruins of Volubilis northwest of Fes. It is, of course, a "course fit for a King." The greens were redesigned by architect James Duncan in 2018.

Ifrane Days 3 & 4

For our next two nights, we will be ensconced in the "Little Switzerland" of Morocco—the storybook village of Ifrane, situated in the Middle Atlas Mountains at 5,463 feet. Our destination is the luxurious 5* Alpine chalet Michlifen Resort & Golf where Morocco's geographic and cultural diversity and wealth begin to come into view. But first—a visit to a Moroccan vineyard for a tour, tasting, and lunch about a two hour drive from Rabat.

Morocco produces about 40 million bottles annually and only 5% are exported—primarily to France. The beginning of viticulture in Morocco originated with the Phoenicians some 4,000 years ago, but not until the 1912-1956 French Protectorate did Morocco gain the winemaking expertise that exists today. After independence in 1956, the wine industry deteriorated and tens of thousands of acres of vineyards were neglected and became fallow. But King Hassan II rejuvenated this industry in the 1990s with significant foreign investment, resulting in delightful wines that will intrigue you. About 75% of wines made in Morocco are red, predominantly Rhône varieties like Syrah, Grenache and Carignan, as well as Cabernet Sauvignon, Tempranillo, and Merlot. Rosé and Vin Gris—a very approachable style of greyish-pink blush wine perfect for summer—are also produced, as are Chardonnays. Domaine de la Zouina, located in the largest wine region in Morocco (Meknès/Fès) in the foothills of the Middle Atlas Mountains, will be our host for a memorable tasting and al fresco lunch in the vineyard that may raise a few eyebrows in pleasant surprise.

En route to Michlifen about an hour from Domaine de la Zouina, we will pass through Ifrane National Park, notable for its precious Atlas Cedar forest and Barbary Macaques (the only macaques to be found outside of Asia). The lush

scenery will reach an apex at Michlifen. A gorgeous mountain lodge with excellent dining, a marvelous spa, indoor/outdoor

pools, tennis courts—and the raison d'être of our stay: the breathtaking Michlifen Golf Course sculpted by Jack Nicklaus, his first design in North Africa. And oh what a design it is.

With panoramic mountain views, holes cut

through cork and oak forests, dramatic rock outcroppings, penal ravines, and crooked-score cliffs to navigate, this par 72 experience has a rating of 75.4 and a slope of 143 from the blacks. Pack an extra sleeve. Or few. Along with your preferred mode of photography.

Fes Days 5, 6, & 7

A mere hour from quaint, quiet Ifrane, we'll enter the time machine that is Fes. The fantasy, history, and spirit of this Imperial City demand an extra day here and an extra dose of culture to accent the golf adventure. Ahhh, Fes. The spiritual heart and soul of Morocco and one of the most medieval of all Arab and Islamic cities, Fes was a source of intellectual and cultural splendor for centuries. Our base in the extraordinary "medina" (old city) will be Palais Amani, once a home to a prestigious Fes family, since painstakingly restored to artisanal glory as a small hotel with a renowned cooking school and traditional hammam to purify body and soul (consider a post-hammam massage on the hotel's rooftop). From here, we'll slowly get acquainted with this UNESCO World Heritage site "medina," its numerous "souqs" (markets), its serpentine alleyways, and sensory deluge. From the hotel's rooftop overlooking the hive of the buzzing "medina", experience the dusk call-to-prayer, with flocks of swifts in flight, and realize you're in a very different and special place. The walled city will be redolent with rhythms, fragrances, patterns, and intensity—a sensory spectacle—like no other.

But first—some cultural color and depth: a local professor of Islamic Studies will have the pleasure of meeting you at your hotel an informal introduction to one of the three great monotheistic faiths. Learn about Islam's history in Morocco, the religion's five pillars, contemporary issues, and its unique practice in Morocco—most notably the custom of venerating "marabouts", or saints. Also learn of Morocco's unique Sufi (mystical Islam) tradition which stands in stark contrast to more orthodox Islam practiced elsewhere, such as in Saudi Arabia, the faith's

birthplace. Even over tea, any perception of a monolithic Islam will likely change.... and herein lies the magic of travel.

During our stay here, you'll discover Moroccan cuisine up-close-and-personal with a hands-on, private cooking course at Palais Amani. You'll learn how to prepare the addictive traditional Moroccan salad, "taktouka" (spicy roasted pepper salad with tomatoes, paprika, coriander, garlic, olive oil, and red pepper flakes), a chicken tagine "mhammer" (roasted) with preserved lemons and olives or perhaps with almonds and golden raisins, and a dessert that will be selected by the chef the day of the class based on what's fresh and available in the souq. This fun, participative, ambient, and informative experience will certainly be something you can replicate once returning home.

Transport yourself back to the late 8th century, and toss your inner compass as you take a guided tour of Fes" 'medina", a UNESCO World Heritage site without equal. Heed Paul Bowles' advice to "lose oneself in the crowd—to be pulled along by it—not knowing where to and for how long... to see the beauty where it is least likely to appear." You will witness firsthand the challenges in balancing sustainable tourism, cultural preservation, and available resources. Immerse yourself in the "Souq el Attarin" (spice market), "Souq en Nejjarin" (carpentry), "Souq el Henna" (henna, traditional/herbal medicines), and the oft-photographed and highly pungent honeycombed tanneries. Admire the artisanship of the 14th century Medersa Bou Inania (a Qur'anic school) with its exquisite "zellij" tilework, woodcarving, and "tadelakt" plasterwork. And marvel at the world's oldest, continuously operating university—in the heart of the Fes medina—al-Qarawiyyin, established in 859.

Let the maze embrace you, tantalizing you with the fragrances of orange blossoms, cinnamon, and cumin...reverberate with the metalworkers hammering copper trays as donkey bray and children play in shadowed alleyways. And, equipped with some key Moroccan Arabic bartering phrases Alex Safos has supplied, spy that fabled hand-woven rug, those "babouche" pointed leather

slippers, or stylish tasseled "djellaba" (the ubiquitous long, flowing hooded garment worn by Moroccans) and prepare for a pleasant, long, tea-soaked bargaining session that will be a lasting memory.

And then...lest we forget—there's golf! Not far from the city center, we'll enjoy a round at Le Royal Golf Fes, designed in 1994 by Cabell Robinson, a RTJ protege



who cut his chops by designing numerous courses in southern Europe and North Africa, including the site of the 2023

Solheim Cup, Finca Cortesin on Spain's Costa del Sol. Wending through olive groves with undulating fairways, lakes, and a backdrop of the Middle Atlas Mountains, this par 72 course may provide more scoring opportunities than what you've encountered thus far. That is, if you can set aside any vertigo from playing golf not far from an 8th Century living museum inside the medina walls. You're on vacation so step a bit forward from the tips and tackle the white tees at 7085 yards with a rating of 72.8 and slope of 134.

Chefchaouen Day 8

Next, we begin our trek to the north and towards the Mediterranean for a golf-free stay to stretch the back and "step away from the game" to refocus for the tour's final round. Our destination leads us into The Rif Mountains where the pretty, precious powder blue town of Chefchaouen is nestled. Not only will you note the change in terrain during the 4 or so hour drive, but you'll notice a change in dress. And the Arabic and French that you have heard thus far in the journey is now complemented by an Amazigh ("Berber" is the derogatory and less desired term) dialect. The Rif is a traditional, rugged stronghold of these indigenous

North African "Free Men," or Imazighen, who pre-dated Islam's arrival in the early 8th century. Although converts to Islam, the Imazighen possess their own language and culture and form part of the fascinating Moroccan mosaic. Their heritage, along with others, was formerly recognized in Morocco's new 2011 Constitution. The text is remarkable—especially given the regional context and the post-"Arab Spring" tragedy, sectarianism, and conflict afflicting many other Arab nations:

"A sovereign Muslim State committed to its national unity and territorial integrity, the Kingdom of Morocco shall seek to preserve its diverse, indivisible national identity. Its unity, which is build on the convergence of its Arab-Islamic, Amazigh and Saharan-Hassani components, is nurtured and enriched by African, Andalusian, Hebraic and Mediterranean constituents."

Chefchaouen (translates to "Two Horns" as a nod to the split mountains that form its scenic stage) was once home to many Spanish Jews who lived alongside Muslims in the 15th century, and their legacy is manifest in the medina's many blue shades meant to mirror the sky and remind them of God. Its walkability, mellowness, and gorgeousness will be yours to explore unabated as there will be ample independent time here.

Our decorative "Dar" (technically a "Dar" is a traditional home with a small central courtyard, sometimes with a fountain; a "Riad" is also a traditional home with a larger central courtyard that has a garden and a fountain—but the terms are now used loosely to connote a restored guesthouse) is within walking distance of the medina and has a splendid vantage point of "The Blue Pearl" below and surrounding Rif. Shopping is markedly less intimidating than elsewhere, the natural setting is conducive to a short hike to the ruins of the Spanish Mosque (built during the Protectorate), or a refreshing walk to Ras el Ma ("head of the water") to observe Riffian women doing laundry, and the tranquility is conducive to protracted coffees in the square...and that tranquility just might be stoked by the "kif" (marijuana) you are likely to smell at some point—this region is home to

Morocco's largest kif cultivation and Morocco is purported to be the largest exporter of marijuana and hashish (cannabis resin) in the world. It is technically illegal yet corruption (and revenue) sustain it as efforts to encourage crop substitution have been eclipsed by Europe's overwhelming demand. Herein is your social studies snapshot amidst "Chaouen's" intoxicating appeal. In addition, your social media snapshots could be voluminous. No surprise, the town is an obvious Instagram darling.

Tangier Days 9 & 10

After a 2.5 hour drive, we will arrive in Tangier where you may sense many secrets, some tawdry and outlandish, others romantic and inspirational. Europe in the form of Spain beckons, visibly, just a few clicks north (sadly, farther than it seems to the many refugees who perish in their desperate attempt to cross). Given its location, Tangier has always been a crossroads—a depot—for language ideas, religions, conflicts, goods, services, contraband, travelers, immigrants, expatriates, artists, wayward seekers, libertines, hippies, authors, spies, con artists, and refugees from the Sahel, sub-Sahara, and as far away as Asia. Amidst the local Moroccan Arabic dialect, you will hear more Spanish spoken here than in other parts of Morocco given its proximity to Spain and the fact a swath of northern Morocco was a Spanish Protectorate from 1912 until Morocco's independence in 1956 (the French Protectorate during this time covered the rest of the country and its impact was more significant). It's a bracing, intriguing mix rich in history, myth, and optimism. You'll understand why Paul Bowles called this home for many years.

Tangier has shed its scruffy 20th century image and, thanks to tremendous investment by King Mohammed VI and outside investors, is a reborn, modern port city with new resorts signaling its rejuvenated priority as a tourist destination.

Before we head to our hotel about a half hour away, we will stretch our legs for a bit of exhilarating up-and-down traversing of Tangier's medina and its Kasbah (the highest fortified point of the medina) with a guided tour. We'll visit the historic Tangier American Legation, the first American public property held outside the US (since 1821) and symbolic of the Treaty of Friendship of 1786 between American and Morocco—the longest such continuous treaty still in existence. The Legation museum's historic artifacts are impressive as is its exemplary Moroccan architecture and design—including ornate lattice woodwork (mashrabiya), tadelakt, and zellij. Be sure to take in the Paul Bowles' wing which houses books, photographs and other memorabilia of Tangier's most famous expatriate writer and composer.

Then onward to a plethora of historic sites, Islamic points of interest (e.g. the supposed tomb of legendary explorer, Ibn Battutah), the home of 1940s socialite, Barbara Hutton, the celebrated cafes of the Petit Socco (Little Square) such as Cafe Central and Cafe Tingis, and after a late lunch if time allows, conclude with a pilgrimage to the iconic Cafe Hafa, for a lazy mint tea on a weathered terrace overlooking the Straits. You may be sitting in the very spot once occupied by Paul Bowles, William Burroughs, Tennessee Williams, Mick Jagger, or George Harrison. As they say in Moroccan Arabic, "zween" ("wonderful")....

Close to sunset, we'll arrive at the Hilton Tangier Al Houara Resort & Spa (now among the esteemed Top 100 Golf Resorts in the World according to GOLF Magazine), about 35 minutes outside Tangier. Situated on the Atlantic Ocean



surrounded by 60 acres of protected forest, with beach access, spa, heated pool, fitness center, multiple bars and restaurants—AND the Al Houara Golf Course designed by Víjay Singh and Graham Marsh—this will be our sanctuary for two nights. Your final round of golf will take in multiple, entrancing/distracting ocean views from this relatively flat, links-style course—spackled with a generous helping of sand and water hazards, courtesy of Singh and Marsh. In addition to the par 72, 7,550 yard from-the-tips 18 hole course, there is a short 9 hole course illuminated at night if you're up for some Skins fun post-dinner, post-cocktail.

Casablanca Day 11

After breakfast, it's about a 4 hour drive back to "Casa" where we'll spend our last night of the tour. After checking into our downtown hotel, packing for the return flight, perhaps fitting in a nap and a shower, and lamenting that yipped 3 footer for birdie or celebrating that sandie for eagle, we'll have a farewell dinner at Rick's Cafe—a fine-dining Morocco institution envisioned and realized by a former US diplomat. "Rick's" pulls off the "Casablanca" Hollywood reverie and replica effortlessly and tastefully, and more than likely, you will hear the pianist play, "As Time Goes By." Which reminds me of a famous Moroccan proverb: "Little by little, the camel goes into the couscous." Meaning, anything is possible in time and with patience. Like the special Morocco experience you just had.

Depart after breakfast to Casablanca airport about 45 minutes away for return flights.
